This magical forest of more than 20 million trees is thought to have partly inspired J. R. R. Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings* trilogy. Located at the south of the border between England and Wales, the landscape certainly feels more Middle Earth than middle England, with acres of soaring oaks, leaf-canopied paths, stepping-stoned streams, and moss-covered hills and dells.

Newland, on the doorstep of the Forest, is the ideal base for a long weekend. A charming village complete with the wonderful Ostrich Pub, $\underline{-01}$. It's a short drive to the huge variety of local attractions. Many walks also start from just behind All Saints' Church in the heart of the village.

A nearby must-visit is Puzzlewood, an other-worldly woodland <u>— **02** —</u>. First spend a few hours exploring the acres of fantastical walkways, rickety bridges, rocky steps and narrow paths <u>— **03** —</u>, then visit the on-site café for post-ramble refreshments.

Many more walking routes on offer criss-cross the forest, including the free-to-visit Sculpture Trail, $\underline{-04}$. The trail begins at Beechenhurst, which is also a great starting point for one of the many cycle routes around the forest. Bikes can be hired around the area (including low-effort e-bikes), and the flat woodland paths mean it's easy to clock up a good distance $\underline{-05}$.

For a thought-provoking insight into the area's mining past, head to Hopewell Collery in Coleford. Run by Richard Daniels, a local 'freeminer', guided tours take visitors 200 metres underground into these narrow, damp tunnels where coal has been extracted for hundreds of years. The experience really brings to life <u>- 06 -</u>.

There are more subterranean adventures nearby at Clearwell Caves, a spectacular natural cave system – **07** –.

If underground exploration is not your thing, a truly entertaining afternoon for all ages can be found at Dean Laser Clay in Newnham. The eco-friendly clay shooting sessions are great fun. No previous shooting skills are needed and it's also nice and quiet – the only noise is the smashing sound effect when you hit one of the reusable discs – 08 –.

For a more historic afternoon, head to Tintern Abbey and marvel at the roofless splendour of this architectural icon on the Banks of the River Wye, just over the border in Wales. Founded in 1131, major conservation work of the chapels is currently underway, but you can still wander through the infirmary, kitchens, cloisters, and sleeping areas <u>— 09 —</u> who once lived and worshipped there. There are many other ways — 10 — besides walking and cycling.
