#### Meeting the King of the Arctic

Sara Macefield experiences the icy Greenland wilderness (and its inhabitants) on a luxury expedition cruise.

To the naked eye, it was just a small white blob slowly -00- (move) between a jumble of rocks. But peering through binoculars, I soon realised that this was the polar bear we -01- (wait, all) to see. It was the latest – and some might say the ultimate – thrill of this two-week cruise along the isolated, rugged shores of Greenland aboard luxury expedition ship *Seabourn Venture*.

Adventurous cruising, especially on sumptuous ships like this, -08 - (boom) in recent years, with a string of new vessels -09 - (launch) to take travellers to some of the planet's most remote spots. Ships are smaller, often with only two or three restaurants, and entertainment -10 - (come) in the form of spotting wildlife or exploring remote landscapes rather than extravagant West End shows or water slides. Daily activities -11 - (lead, usually) by an on-board team of expedition guides and range from hikes and Zodiac rides to kayaking trips or helicopter jaunts.

For much of the year, these waterways -12 – (encase) by sea ice, rendering them impassable, but milder summer temperatures bring a brief respite as it starts to thaw, -13 – (enable) ships like ours to gently nudge into the frozen inner sanctum.

Heavier ice floes than usual meant *Seabourn Venture* was the first vessel of the year -14 – (access) the fjords when we arrived in mid-August. Upon entering the sound, we -15 – (reward) with incredible views of this icy wonderland.
