

LISTENING – TRANSCRIPT

EDITH WILSON

Introduction: In the following radio programme, you will hear the first part of the story of Edith Wilson, wife of U.S. President Woodrow Wilson. You will hear the recording twice.

In October 1919, Edith Bolling Galt Wilson, wife of U.S. President Woodrow Wilson, began, in her own words, the first female “stewardship” of the presidency. Her husband had suffered a life-threatening stroke and, in a time of crisis for U.S. democracy, she stepped into the role of acting president. Her actions were controversial at the time and continue to divide opinion to this day.

Edith Bolling was born in Wytheville, Virginia, on October 15, 1872. She was the seventh of 11 children from a Southern family that owned a plantation together with enslaved people. Edith had the pedigree for the White House: She was related to President Thomas Jefferson and to first ladies Martha Washington and Letitia Tyler. Her father was a court of appeals judge, her mother from colonial Virginia. The family lost most of its wealth after the American Civil War and Edith grew up in a small boarding house. In personality, she was not unlike her father’s mother, Grandmother Bolling, whom she describes in her autobiography as “an unusually capable and dominant person, to whom an obstacle meant only something to be overcome.”

On her 15th birthday, Edith was sent to Martha Washington College in Abingdon, Virginia, but was deeply unhappy and stayed for only two semesters. She later studied at a women’s college in Richmond for a year but received little other formal education. In the winter of 1890, while visiting her elder sister in Washington, D.C., Edith met Norman Galt, a wealthy jeweler nearly ten years older than her. The couple were married on April 30, 1896. Galt & Bro. Jewelers was part of the D.C. establishment and Edith enjoyed a lifestyle she had not previously experienced. She loved driving, and became the first woman in Washington, D.C., to receive a driver’s license. After a short illness, Galt died unexpectedly in January 1908. The family jewelry business, which Edith inherited, had fallen on hard times, but with support and advice, she successfully led the firm’s recovery.

Now in her mid-30s, Edith was a wealthy widow. She travelled across Europe but was happiest at home in D.C. Although she had little interest in politics, Edith must have been pleased when Woodrow Wilson, from Staunton, Virginia, won the presidential election on November 5, 1912. He was the first Southerner to win since 1848, when Zachary Taylor, from Orange County, Virginia, had been elected president.
